I will not be joining them, as I have finally reached that date in my 52-year career when retirement beckons.

More than half a century of working, first in local newspaper journalism in East Anglia, followed by seven years as a Press Officer with Essex Police and then as Publications and Media Manager for MDP.

I have been blessed with having some of the best colleagues I could have hoped for to work alongside me at every stage of my career and it is those whom I shall miss the most as I set off in search of fresh adventures.

Thank you to everyone I have worked with in this organisation, both past and present and good luck to all those keeping the good ship MDP afloat for hopefully another half a century.
