## Final Pass Out Parade at Wethersfield

On Friday 15 July, the Ministry of Defence Police (MDP) held its final Pass Out Parade at Wethersfield, following the Force's move of Headquarters to RAF Wyton earlier this year, and with training due to transfer to Southwick Park, Hampshire during August.

Pass Out Parade events for new recruits to mark the end of their training, and celebrate with friends and family, have been held at the former US airbase in Wethersfield every year the MDP has been recruiting, since the Force relocated there in 1995. The only exception to this was during the COVID-19 pandemic when there were no parade events.

The final event also saw the digging up of the time capsule buried outside the Headquarters building, under the flag poles, during a special ceremony to mark the Force's 25th anniversary in 1996. It was to have been dug up 25 years later, on the MDP's 50th Anniversary and although the MDP celebrated its half century on 1 October 2021, it was decided to delay the

lifting of the time capsule until the last pass out parade event to take place at Wethersfield.



Chief Constable Andy Adams said:

"The raising of the time capsule at our final Pass Out Parade at Wethersfield, during what is still the 50th year of the MDP, is particularly fitting as we prepare to fully vacate the Wethersfield site, when training begins at Southwick Park in August. This is an exciting

time of change for the Force and whilst we reflect on the years gone by, we are very much focused on the future. With that in mind, during October we will be burying a new time capsule outside our new Headquarters at Palmer Pavilion, RAF Wyton, during our official opening ceremony. That time capsule will then be raised again in 25 years' time, to mark the MDP's 75th Anniversary."

# The time capsule contained:

- a collection of memorabilia, including several corporate documents and a truncheon
- Passing Out Programmes and a class list from the year of the Force's 25th anniversary when there was only one intake of 39 recruits
- prospectus documents from local schools invited to contribute, including one from the Wethersfield C of E Primary School
- personal artifacts, such as postcards and pictures, from MDP families
- a West Ham Football programme from 1996
- a copy of the Sunday Times

- previous editions of Talk Through The magazine of the Ministry of Defence Police
- artwork of MDP officers and their capabilities, and the MDP Band, which played at Passing Out ceremonies from 1987 to 2000
- some more unusual items, including a stamp collection belonging to former MDP Deputy Chief Constable Anthony V Comben
- and beer bottle labels from the commemorative ale produced for the Force's 25th anniversary by Ridley's Brewery

ROA Chairman Geoff Heal and Treasurer Ken Hicks together with their wives Jenny and Sylvia were pleased to represent ROA at the pass out parade and congratulate the new recruits who graduated.

### In Memoriam

Alexander Connor – 19<sup>th</sup> May 2022 Melvyn (Lofty) Waterman – 19<sup>th</sup> July 2022



Retired member Paul Kerry passed away in **October 2012** and his wife Doreen has written a tribute to her husband which we are happy to publish as follows.

Having left school at the age of 18 Paul already knew he wanted to be a Police Officer and took up his first post as a constable in June 1977 after having passed out at Ashford training college upon which he was stationed at Horley Police Station in Surrey.

Having then joined the Ministry of Defence Police in 1979 he was stationed at RARDE Fort Halstead then sent to USAF Greenham Common in 1983. A promotion to sergeant in 1984 meant a transfer to ROF Bridgwater and in 1989 he spent a year at MDP Duke of York Barracks and the US Naval base in Ruislip.

In October 1990 Paul was transferred to HMNB Devonport on promotion to Inspector then moving from shift inspector to inspector of operations at MDPHQ in 1993.

Transferred to the Royal Naval Air Station in Culdrose in 1996, he then took up a new posting to RMCS Shrivenham in 1998 and from there was posted to JSU Corsham where the decision to take early voluntary retirement in March 2012 was not one he had taken lightly so passed up the offer of a further job promotion so as not to have to uproot his family who were settled in Swindon.

Paul was the youngest of all Police Search Advisors (POLSA) and had undertaken in excess of 200 venue searches for IED's by the time he left the force. In receipt of the both the Queens Golden Jubilee Medal and Diamond Jubilee Medal, he also received the Police Long Service and Good Conduct Medal for which his 33 years in the Force was described by the Chief Constable as 'exemplary.'

Paul joined the TAVR in November 1975 as a signalman with 39th (City of London) Royal Signals Regiment and it was there that he met Doreen in 1976. They got married in 1977 and were heading towards their 35th wedding anniversary when his life was cut short in hospital through no fault of his own 11 days short of that.

Still shocked by the events that led to her husband being taken away from her when he was looking forward to his retirement after having given so much time to his job for which she had supported him throughout, she set to write her memoirs as a tribute to him in which she hopes some of his colleagues may look fondly back on the times they had spent with him described as 'the best boss ever.'

Paul was also survived not only by his wife but also daughters Laura and Lisa, son Paul, and grandchildren Jay, Billy, Lola and Brooke.

As the 10th anniversary of Paul's death approaches any money from the sale of her books will be turned into a lasting memorial.
